

World Heritage Sites can support a variety of ongoing and proposed uses that are ecologically and culturally sustainable. Management and use of sites should ensure maintenance of the values for which the site is nominated in the first place. The communities' visions, reflected in land-use plans, provincial policy and the nomination document will clarify how the Pimachiowin Aki site will be used and managed for the benefit of the communities and others.

Will a World Heritage Site affect Aboriginal and treaty rights?

The designation will not affect aboriginal and treaty rights. They will remain intact.

Who will actually own the land in the World Heritage Site?

The World Heritage Site designation would not change the current ownership of the land.

What benefits would a World Heritage Site provide?

The project can help:

- Anishinabe care for the land
- First Nations continue a leadership role in the stewardship of the land
- Draw international attention
- Teach others about preserving and keeping the land, language and culture
- Create jobs and new opportunities on the land.
